Girl Scout Juniors must complete 6 of the activities.

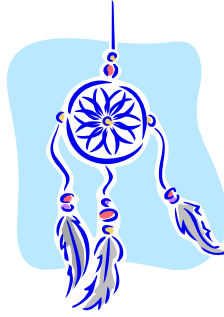

Skill Builders

1. Name five (5) American Indian tribes still living in North Carolina. Name at least two (2) tribes that lived here in the past.
2. Choose a tribe and learn some of the following:
 - a. What its name means?
 - b. Where the tribe was/is located?
 - c. How did they dress?
 - d. What did they eat?
 - e. Is the tribe still in existence? If not, what happened to it?
3. On a map of North Carolina, show where Indian tribes lived in the past throughout the state and where tribes live today.
4. Find five (5) North Carolina places that have Indian names.
5. Learn the following: (Hint: visit <http://www.archaeology.ncdcr.gov/>)
 - a. The eight (8) state-recognized tribes
 - b. The only federally-recognized tribe in North Carolina
 - c. When is North Carolina Indian Heritage Month
6. The American Indians introduced many new things to the white settlers. Learn what some of these things are and name three of these things you enjoy today.
7. Take a trip to a museum or place of historical interest to learn about American Indians of North Carolina.
8. Invite a member of an American Indian tribe to visit your troop. Have them tell you about their tribe, their tribal government, what their traditions are, etc.
9. Many American Indians have contributed and continue to contribute to our society. Learn about an American Indian and his/her contributions and his/her background.
10. Learn about the "Trail of Tears".



Technology – Search the Internet

- 1.** Find out about tribal ceremonies. Choose a ceremony and learn about its significance, what special costumes were worn, what dances were performed. Perform the ceremony for your troop. Make your costume.
- 2.** American Indians are known for creation of multiple different games. Many of these games had a specific purpose. Learn two (2) games and their significance or history. Play these games with your troop. If there is equipment needed for the game, make it.
- 3.** Find out about American Indian crafts such as pottery, weaving, beading, painting, leather work or basketry. Make a project from one of these art forms.
- 4.** Learn what American Indians from North Carolina ate. How many of these foods do you eat today? Prepare an American Indian dish to share with your troop.
- 5.** American Indian stories and legends were preserved by story tellers. Learn an American Indian story or legend and tell it to your troop.
- 6.** Learn an American Indian dance and perform it for your troop.
- 7.** Music and musical instruments are important to American Indian culture. Research the different types of instruments they used and try to make it.
- 8.** Name the only American Indian Tribe to have a written alphabet. Learn about the alphabet and language. Write your name in the alphabet.

Service Projects

1. Develop a display about North Carolina American Indian history for your school or local library.
2. Perform a service project for a local American Indian tribe.
3. Help develop a hands-on activity for a historical museum that interprets the daily lives and times of American Indians.
4. Share what you have learned with another Girl Scout troop.
5. Visit your local museum or library. Develop a plan for raising public awareness about issues affecting American Indians. Present your ideas in a public forum.

Career Exploration

1. Interview someone who works in a field that deals with American Indian history, like a librarian, historian, author, or teacher.
2. Investigate at least three different American Indian history courses in local colleges or universities. What do these courses include and to which possible career options do they lead. If possible, interview someone who is a student in one of these programs.
3. Contact your local historical society or the North Carolina Commission of Indian Affairs and ask about what kinds of jobs are available. What education or training is required for these positions?
4. Interview a modern day American Indian or a member of a re-enactment group. Find out about their heritage, career goals, and job opportunities.
5. Visit an exhibit on American Indian life at a history museum. Find out what is involved in being a curator of items used in daily life, traditional and ceremonial dress, dwellings, etc.
