

Communication in our Lives

Communicating with other people is an important part of our daily lives. How many people do you communicate with regularly? It might be more than you think!

Try this quick and simple exercise: imagine a typical day. Make a list of all the people you interact with, starting from the moment you wake up. Make sure to include people you speak with, write to, wave to, and share a smile with—those are all ways we communicate!

Would your results be different if you picked a school day or a weekend day, a day in the summer or one in the winter? How would your total number of people change if you didn't actually see any of the people on your list in person? What ways might you be able to communicate with those people from a distance?

Communication Technologies

Throughout history, people have been creating new ways to communicate with others, especially when it comes to sending messages between people separated by distance. In Ancient Greece, runners trained to run long distances between cities to deliver important messages. One of these professional runners, Pheidippides, became the inspiration for marathon races!

Pigeons were also used in places across the world to send messages back to a specific location. People on ships would send messages and signals to others using flags.

Sending messages became much easier in the 1840s, when the electric telegraph was invented. This allowed people to send a message that was tapped out in Morse code and transmitted through a wire, then translated back into words for the recipient of the message.

Soon after, people began making devices that resembled what would become the telephone. The telephone made communication between people much easier, but it didn't start out looking like most phones we use today!

Sending letters and exchanging written words has become much easier since the days of messenger pigeons—an email can send a message almost instantly! We now use computers not just for email communications, but also to see people using video platforms.



Communicating with our Communities

With so many different ways to communicate, how do we choose? Secret Messages

Learn Morse code with a friend or family member, and send them a message that's at least five words long. You can send the message by writing the code, blinking it out in long a short flashes of light from a lamp or flashlight, or sounding in out with long and short "beeps." Research another way to send coded messages and try sending the same message. How are the codes different? In what situation would Morse code be the better one to use?


Make a Fortune Teller
