FOR GIRL SCOUT BROWNIE

Overview

In this badge, you will try some special Brownie traditions (some that Girl Scouts have been sharing for over 100 years!) - and, of course, have a world of Girl Brownie fun.



Material List

- Construction or other colored paper
- Crayons, markers, or colored pencils
- Jump rope
- Old magazines or catalogs
- Glue stick

Step 1: Sing Everywhere

Songs are fun no matter where you are. Singing brings us together and helps us feel connected, strong, and proud. Girl Scouts sing in special places or to mark special times — or sometimes just for the fun of it!

Learn three new Girl Scout songs. Teach them to your family, and talk about why you like each one. Then if you want record your somg and upload it here to be added to the virtual sing a long.



Learn a new singing game, an action song, and a hand-clapping song. Try clapping your hands or stomping your feet in time to songs like "The Hokey Pokey" or "If You're Happy and You Know It." Once you've learned your songs, teach them to your family, and sing them together.

Step 2: Celebrate Juliette Low's birthday

Girl Scout celebrations honor women and girls who change the world. As a Brownie, celebrate our founder's birthday. Juliette "Daisy" Gordon Low wanted girls to have a place to come together as sisters while having fun and doing good. Even though her birthday is on October 31st, let's celebrate her birthday now!

Choose one of the options below to complete this step!

Make a birthday card for a friend. In honor of Daisy Low's birthday, make and send a card to a friend or family member. Inside, tell her your favorite things about being a Brownie.



Make up a birthday message.

Three years in a row, Daisy wrote a message to all the Girl Scouts. See the messages in the link above. Then write your own birthday message about something you want Girl Scouts to know today. Share your message with other girls in your troop or with your family.



Step 3: Share sisterhood

"Sisterhood" doesn't mean sisters in your family. All the girls and women who are Girl Scouts try to live by the Girl Scout Law. That's what makes us a Girl Scout sisterhood, and in this badge, you'll practice living its lines.

Make up a game about your favorite line of the Law. You could create a jump rope song that includes the names of all the members of your family (that's being considerate and caring). Or you could practice being honest and fair while you play your favorite board game with your family.

OR

Create a story or a puppet show. Make it about how you try to live the Girl Scout Law. Maybe you can share a good turn you did for someone. Tell or perform it for your family.

OR

Make a mural, collage, or flag. Create something that shows the sisterhood between all the girls in your troop, or between Girl Scouts everywhere. Display your artwork where you will see it and remember all your Girl Scout sisters.

Step 4: Leave a place better than you found it

It's the Girl Scout way to care about the world around us—whether it's a room, a campground, or the world. Practice by leaving a place in your home better than you found it. Then share how it made you feel with your family.

Choose one of the options below to complete this step!



A better room or home. Think of three ways you could leave your room or your home better than you found it each day. Choose one and do it for a week.



A better garden. Find a way you could help make your yard better than you found it. Maybe you could help plant some flowers or start a garden, or sweep the pollen off your front step. Choose a way and do it.

Step 5: Enjoy Girl Scout traditions

Traditions bring people together. A tradition can be a special food, a ceremony, a song — anything that's passed along through the years.


Try one of these to share in a Girl Scout tradition!
