LIFESAVING AWARDS—EVERY GIRL SCOUT IS PREPARED TO DO HEROIC THINGS!

Girl Scouts of the USA recognizes heroes in our Girl Scout Community by bestowing honors for heroism, and lifesaving service. Lifesaving Awards have been a part of the Girl Scout program since the beginning of the movement in the United States, Lifesaving Awards are national awards given to any registered Girl Scout from 5 through 17 years of age, that have saved or attempted to save a human life under circumstances that indicate heroism or risk of her own life beyond the degree of maturity and training to be expected at their age.

Lifesaving awards are only conferred by GSUSA through a council nomination.

KINDS OF AWARDS



The Lifesaving Medal of Honor Award is one of the highest, rarest, and most prestigious recognitions a Girl Scout can be awarded, and it's emblematic of the Girl Scout Promise and Law which teaches girls to help people at all times and make the world a better place. APPLICATION PROCEDURE

Applications for Lifesaving Awards must be requested within <u>60 days</u> of the incident and submitted within <u>six months</u> after the accident occurred.

Applications must meet the following requirements:

- Application form must be completed giving full details of the incident.
- Application must be accompanied by a personally signed statement from
 - the rescuer
 - the rescued person
 - the witnesses (not more than three)
- Each statement must describe the details of the rescue as the person making the statement recalls them.
- Application must be signed by the adult volunteer.
- Application must be approved by the Girl Scouts—North Carolina Coastal Pines before being submitted to GSUSA.

Molten Lava Cakes

Ingredients:

- 6 (1-ounce) squares bittersweet chocolate
- 2 (1-ounce) squares semisweet chocolate
- 10 tablespoons (1 1/4 stick) butter
- 1/2 cup all-purpose flour
- 1 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 3 egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Directions:

Preheat oven to 425 degrees F. Grease 6 (6-ounce) custard cups. Melt the chocolates and butter in the microwave, or in a double boiler. Add the flour and sugar to chocolate mixture. Stir in the eggs and yolks until smooth. Stir in the vanilla. Divide the batter evenly among the custard cups. Place in the oven and bake for 7 minutes. The edges should be firm but the center will be runny. Run a knife around the edges to loosen and invert onto dessert plates.

In 2016 the opportunity to open the first franchise location for Flour Power Kids Cooking Studios came around and I was immediately interested! This franchise offered everything I was interested in: cooking, teaching life skills and making new friends. We opened in June of 2016 with a summer of sold out camps. We continue to stay quite busy not only with camps but with cooking classes for all ages, parties, and special events. We even host special Girl scout Events, with a special Flour Power patch for our participants.

Owning a business can bring many challenges but I find my favorite part is being at the studio with the kids and families. We are able to give back to the community by offering a free, monthly special needs cooking class at the studio.

My advice to anyone considering starting a business: believe in yourself, follow your passion, love what you do! Find a great role model. Have goals and try to reach those goals... no matter how small they may seem. Don't give up on *your dream and surround yourself* with positive, supportive people.
