

American Patriotism Patch Program

Girl Scouts - North Carolina Coastal Pines
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The purpose of the American Patriotism Patch is to help girls learn more about our national flag, our country's freedom, and why we should be proud to be Americans. In addition, girls are learning more about the United States military, women who have impacted change, and events that have shaped the American people into who we are today.

Required Activity: This activity is required for all Girl Scouts to complete the patch program.

Patriotism is defined as the feeling of love, devotion, and sense of attachment to one's country.

Reflect on the definition for Patriotism (above). Does reading this definition bring up a memory or experience for you? Have you had an experience that caused you to feel great pride in your country? After taking time to reflect on the definition and your memories, share this experience with your troop, family, and/or friends.

Ask someone close to you (a member of your family, neighbor, troop leader, etc.) to share a time when they experienced a feeling of love, devotion, or sense of attachment to their country.

2. Cadence is defined as the beat, time, or measure of rhythmical motion or activity. It has been used in the military since the Revolutionary War. 3. Wikipedia defines a bugle call as “a short tune, originating as a military signal announcing scheduled and certain non-scheduled events on a military installation, battlefield, or ship. A defining feature of a bugle call is that it consists only of notes from a single overtone series. This is in fact a requirement if it is to be playable on a bugle or equivalently on a trumpet without moving the valves. Bugle calls typically indicated the change in daily routines of camp. Every duty around camp had its own bugle call.”

5. At Girl Scouts a flag ceremony honors the American flag as the symbol of our country and all the hopes, dreams, and people it consists of. Flag ceremonies may take place in meeting rooms, outdoor settings, large auditoriums, on stage, even on horseback. Flag ceremonies can be part of any activity that honors the American flag.

7. Wearing red on Fridays, known as R.E.D Friday, is the weekly tradition for American and Canadian civilians to wear an article of red clothing to support troops that are deployed abroad.

8. Did you know? *North Carolina has one of the largest military footprints of any state in the country, representing three out of the four branches of service. Military and defense industries are the second largest employers in our state. partnerships that have developed between local and state government, military and defense sectors, and local businesses throughout our history.

1. Interview a Veteran or Military Child. Below is a sample list of questions. Be sure to take notes so that you can share the answers with your troops, friends, or family.

Veteran (be sure to thank them for their service):

- When were you drafted or when did you enlist?
- What do you remember about the day you enlisted?
- How did you tell your family and friends that you were joining the military?
- How did you choose your branch of service?
- How did you stay in touch with family and friends back home?
- What advice do you have for anyone who is interested in joining the military?

Military Child:

- Which one of your parents is in the military?
- How many schools have you attended?
- How many states have you lived in? Countries?
- Do you have any collectibles from other states? Other countries?
- How do you adjust to moving to a new place? Has being a member of Girl Scouts helped you transition more easily in a new location?
- What advice do you have for other military kids who may be having a difficult time?

2. The American flag is symbol of strength, opportunity, sacrifice, and hope for many. Knowing the history of the flag will lead you closer to understanding why the American People proudly wave it. Dig into information about the American flag. Locate the answer these questions:

3. Invite someone to your troop meeting who has served his/her/their country to talk about patriotism, our flag, and what freedom means to them.

4. Name that patriot! Using the questions below as a guide, discuss the many ways that women have been incorporated in the U.S. Military. Know someone else? Share information about them with your troop, friends, or family.

- In 1891, _____ applied to be surgeon with the Union Army. She is also the only woman to have received the Medal of Honor in U.S. history.
- _____ served as a nurse for Union regiments before moving on to a larger role as spymaster and military scout. What was her name?
- In 1942, _____ became a member of the first training class of the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps (later, Women's Army Corps, or WAC) before commanding the largest all-female unit to serve overseas.
- In 1979, _____ became the first Black female pilot in the U.S. military. She also became the 55th woman to earn her pilot wings, before being assigned to the 394th Transportation Battalion in Germany, the unit's first black soldier and first woman leader.
- _____ became the first woman to command American soldiers in battle in 1989- a trailblazing role that launched a reflection about women in the military.

- In 2015, _____ and _____ became the first two women to complete Army Ranger School and earn their Ranger tabs since the Ranger School's inception in 1950.
- In 2008 Retired Army General _____ became the first woman to reach a four-star officer rank in the history of the United States military.

Take Action

1. Individually or as a troop create a poster or collage of women in government or military who have sparked change in America. Talk about the change these women sparked and the impact.

2. Operation Cookie Drop is a community service project that brings a sweet taste of home to deployed military men and women and those serving our country at home. Girl Scouts – North Carolina Coastal Pines has donated over 1 million boxes of cookies to our military men and women serving our country. Each year individual Girl Scouts and troops create letters/cards to send with the donated cookies. When completing this patch program between January and March, write a letter/story or draw a picture to be sent to military troops along with the Girl Scout Cookies. The USO stands for the United Service Organizations, Inc. and focuses its mission on serving active duty military members and their families. The USO outreach program physically delivers support to service members during difficult deployments with care packages, holiday packages, and internet services. 3. Make a public display about our flag and patriotism to educate others. Search online for pictures of other displays as inspiration. Example: bulletin board at school, church, mall or in three-dimensional form.

4. Draw a picture, write a poem, or create a logo about “what patriotism means to you”. You can draw it on paper, put it on a t-shirt, hat, button, or other any other item that will be visible to others. Get creative!

5. If completing this patch program in April, wear purple to your troop meeting and take a group photo. During any other month of the year, wear red to your troop meeting and take a group photo. [Submit your photo](#) and share something that you have learned about patriotism by completing the patch program.

6. A historic site is an official location where pieces of political, military, cultural, or social history have been preserved due to their cultural heritage value. Look up historical sites in your area. Plan to take a walk to that site (or visit virtually) and discuss the history and significance of the historic site.

7. Host a flag ceremony at your next troop meeting, special event, or ceremony.

Resource Section

Vocabulary to Know

- Aircraft carrier - military ship designed so aircraft can land on and take off from it
- Ammunition dump - location where ammunition and explosives are stored
- Barrage - protective firing of indirect firing weapons
- Boundaries - company and battalion defense areas; limited due to terrain and means of approach
- Boots on the ground- ground troops engaged in an operation
- Charge - part of a fire command; establishes the amount of propellant in a shell
- Checkpoint - easy-to-identify point on terrain; used for controlling movement or identifying locations
- Civic action - using military forces on projects beneficial to a civilian population or economic development of a particular area; often are agriculture, education, public works, communications, sanitation, or health projects
- Clandestine - military activities intended to be kept secret or concealed
- Constraint - a requirement that restricts the strategies or tactics that can be used
- Debarkation - process of unloading equipment, supplies or troops from an aircraft or ship
- Decontamination - the process of removing traces of chemical or biological agents from a person, object, or area for safety purposes
- Deployment - troop movement to position forces in a specific location, positioning troops for rapid action
- Dump - location where military supplies are stored
- Ejection - escape from an aircraft by means of an independently propelled seat or capsule
- Fleet- collection of forces under a commander's control; may include forces, ships, and aircraft
- Geronimo- yelled when jumping off something
- Got your six- watching your back
- Ground Zero- point of origin for violent activity (such as where a bomb hits); specific point directly below explosion of a nuclear weapon
- In the trenches- stuck in a drawn out, tough fight
- Logistics- process of planning and carrying out troop movements
- No man's land- Dangerous ground or a topic that is dangerous to discuss
- Obstacle- natural or artificial barrier that impedes or stops military unit
- Roger That- Yes
